Our theme this week is HOME AS LAND, a favorite topic among many Kansas poets. They use the **American** 

**Cinquain** as their medium—22 syllables divided among 5 lines in this way: 2, 4, 6, 8, 2.

Two reasons I like the cinquain so much for this project: 1) it's a simple form that welcomes both beginners and longtime poets, and 2) it combines the verbal with the numerical. Enter **Rebecca Roberts,** a mathematics instructor at UMKC for 28 years. She recently retired with her husband to rural Miami County, near Lane, where they were married 38 years ago. The well by the rock house had almost gone dry, so the only bath that day was for the bride.

**Larry Heffel** grew up in the blue haze of the Saline River Valley north of Dorrance and now lives with his wife in Lenexa. The phrase "blue remembered hills" alludes to an A. E. Housman poem from *A Shropshire Lad* and sets up the cinquain's music and melancholic tone.
