

The Future of Kansas History Summit

September 24-25, 2026, at the Kansas Museum of History, Topeka

The Future of Kansas History Summit is a one-day event inspired by America's 250th that showcases the importance of local history in telling the stories of America. Sponsored by Humanities Kansas and the Kansas Historical Society with support from the Patterson Family Foundation and the *History Makers: The Future is Now* initiative. All events will be held at the Kansas Museum of History, 6425 SW 6th Ave, except for the early bird tour of the Charles Curtis house.

Thursday, September 24, 2026

1:00 Early bird tour of the Curtis House

Advanced registration required.

Bus departs at 1:10 pm from the Kansas Historical Society at 6425 SW 6th Avenue to take guests to the historic house. The bus will return no later than 3:00 pm. *Thank you to Clayton Financial Partners for underwriting the bus!*

Charles Curtis was the Vice President of the United States from 1929-1933 and served under President Herbert Hoover. Built in 1879, this grand house in downtown Topeka was home to Charles Curtis and his family from 1907 until his death in 1938. Curtis was a member of the Kaw and Osage nations, and he was the first Indigenous U.S. Vice President. The house is now a state historic site, but not yet open to the public, so this is your sneak peek! Join Patrick Zollner, executive director of the Kansas Historical Society, as he shares stories about the Curtis home. *The house is currently not handicapped accessible. The guided tour will last approximately one hour.*
